# FEASTDAYS/ SAINTSDAYS IN OCTOBER:

**St. Innocent** [Glorification] Oct. 6th (1798 - 1879): Born is Siberia, St. Innocent spent his early priesthood as a mission-



ary in Alaska, and later (after the death of his wife), as first resident bishop there. Later in life he came to head the Russian Orthodox Church as Metropolitan of Moscow. He developed an Aleut alphabet and translated c catechism and the Gospel of St. Matthew into that Alaskan language.

**St. Tikhon** [Glorification] Oct. 9th (1865 - 1925): Presiding Bishop of the Russian Orthodox Missionary Diocese of North America from 1898 - 1907, during which time the Church in America, bolstered by recent immigration of Slavic peoples from Eastern Europe, grew rapidly. In 1907 he returned to Russia serving as archpastor of several dioceses there. In 1918 he was elected Patriarch the Russian



Orthodox Church. Until his death in 1925 he defended the Church, as best he could and knew how, from the Bolsheviks, who had come to power just as he was elected Patriarch. This year marks the 25th anniversary of his consecration.

## Archpriest John Kochurov [Repose] Oct. 31st (1871-



1917): A missionary priest in Mid-west America from 1895 to1907, upon his return to Russia he served parishes in the St. Petersburg Diocese. The first clergy martyr under the Bolsheviks; he was shot and killed at the outbreak of the 1917 Revolution.

The Mother of God Joy of All Who Sorrow icon (Oct 24th) revealed itself as a miracle-working icon for the first time in Moscow in 1688. Euphemia, the sister of the patriarch at that time, Joachim, lived in Moscow and suffered since a long time from a severe incurable disease in her side. This exposed her inner organs and she was hardly alive. Once, in her prayer to our Lord Jesus Christ and to His Mother, she heard a voice, instructing her to pray before the icon called Joy of All Who Sorrow in one of the local churches.

The molieben was served and, following it, the icon was brought into her house. Euphemia was sprinkled with holy water. She got well and rose from her bed by herself. This miracle took place on October 24, and a feast to the icon was established to com-



memorate that event. The Mother of God on this icon is portrayed in full figure with the Christ child in her arms. There is an angel on each side of her, and the faithful with their petitions for help and cure are at her feet. There are numerous recorded cases of divine help to all in need and in trouble, to those who suffer from seizure, infirmity in hands, throat diseases, trembling of muscles, stroke, and tuberculosis.

Another miracle took place in the village of Klochka near St. Petersburg, not far from a glass factory, in 1888. An image of the Joy of All Who Sorrow was hanging in the village chapel. The building was struck by lightning, shattering the alms box and charring the chapel walls. The icon Joy of All Who Sorrow was found lying face down on the floor. When it was turned over, the image was found to have become fresh and clear, and coins from the alms box were sticking to its surface. Previously the icon, which had originally been found washed ashore on the Neva River, was dark and obscure. Its "Renewal" was seen as a sign from heaven, and its fame spread. Since then, the icon has been commemorated on July 23rd.



#### The Protection of the Most-holy Theotokos PROLOG FROM OHRID by St. NIKOLAI VELIMIROVICH

From time immemorial, the Church has celebrated the Mostholy Theotokos as the patroness and protectress of the Christian people, who, by her intercessory prayers, implores God's mercy for us sinners. The help of the Most-holy Mother of God has been clearly shown numerous times, to individuals and to nations, in peace and in war, in monastic deserts and in densely populated cities. The event that the Church commemorates and celebrates today confirms the Theotokos' consistent protection of Christian people. On October 1, 911, during the reign of Emperor Leo the Wise, there was an All-night Vigil in the Blachernae Church of the Mother of God in Constantinople. The church was full of people. St. Andrew the Fool-for-Christ was standing in the rear of the church with his disciple Epiphanius. At four o'clock in the morning, the Most-holy Theotokos appeared above the people, holding her omophorion outstretched as a protective covering for the faithful. She was clothed in goldencrusted purple, and shone with an ineffable radiance, surrounded by apostles, saints, martyrs and virgins. St. Andrew said to Blessed Epiphanius: ``Do you see, brother, the Queen and Lady of all praying for the whole world?" Epiphanius replied: ``I see, Father, and am struck with amazement!" The Feast of the Protection was instituted to commemorate this event, and to remind us that we can prayerfully receive the unceasing protection of the Mostholy Theotokos in any time of difficulty.

## REFLECTION

The Most-holy Theotokos has often appeared to holy men in need: sometimes to encourage them in asceticism, or to heal them from sickness, or to reveal a certain mystery to them. Two similar, wonderful events took place in the Great Lavra on the Holy Mountain. In Great Lent, during the chanting of the Great Akathist, St. John Koukouzelis was tired and sat down, facing the icon of the Theotokos. As he sat, he fell asleep. Just then, the Holy Most-pure One appeared to him in heavenly light and said: ``Rejoice, O John! Chant and do not stop chanting, and for this I will not abandon you." With this, she placed a gold coin in John's hand. When he awoke from sleep, the gold coin was still in his hand. After this, many wonderful miracles were worked from the icon of the Theotokos, as well as from the gold coin.

The second incident involved St. Gregory the monk, who, like John Koukouzelis, was a church cantor. Patriarch Kallistos had established that in the Liturgy of St. Basil the Great, ``All Creation Rejoices in Thee" be sung in place of ``It Is Truly Meet." His successor, Patriarch Philotheus, rescinded this, reinstating ``It Is Truly Meet" because of its brevity. But then, on the eve of the Theophany, and in the presence of Patriarch Gregory of Alexandria, St. Gregory sang ``All Creation Rejoices in Thee" instead. Immediately after this, the Holy Most-pure One appeared to him, and, as she had done to John Koukouzelis, placed a gold coin in his hand. She said: ``I am very grateful for your singing in my honor.' 'Because of this, it was instituted that all Liturgies of St. Basil would thereafter include ``All Creation Rejoices in Thee."



# What is Christianity and where does the Orthodox Church fit in?

## Christianity

Christianity has become so fragmented that it is now almost impossible to summarize what Christians as a whole believe and still be talking about all who call themselves Christians.

However, the Christian faith in the fullness of its traditional manifestation can be said to be based upon the following intuitions and affirmations:

- 1. There is "defineable," recognizable Truth—relativism is unacceptable. (Truth)
- 2. Truth finds its ultimate expression in God, the One Who Is—"I am." (Monotheism)
- God has revealed Himself to Man—His creature—in history in various ways and ultimately through His Son, Jesus Christ. (Incarnation)
- 4. God has sent His Spirit to be with us until the end of this world when we will be received into His Kingdom if we are found to be His servants. (The Trinity/Eschatology)

## What is the Orthodox Church?

The Orthodox Church is the original Christian Church established by our Lord Jesus Christ upon the foundation of the Apostles, Himself being the chief Cornerstone, and enlivened by the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost.

The Orthodox Church is nothing less than *the* Church, founded by our Lord Jesus Christ. Although the Orthodox Church judges the soul of no man, leaving judgment solely to God, She does claim that She, and She alone, is the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church confessed in the Nicene Creed.

The claim of the Orthodox Church to be the one and only *true* Church (and by extension, therefore, the one and only true religion or belief system) is based upon four factors:

1. That the Orthodox Church has maintained an *unbroken historical continuity* with the original Church founded by Jesus in Jerusalem. (True History)

2. That the Orthodox Church has *faithfully maintained the apostolic faith* "once delivered to the Apostles" (Jude 3), neither adding to nor subtracting from it. (True Faith/Doctrine)

3. That the Orthodox Church faithfully and *rightly worships* God the Father in Spirit and Truth, providing mankind with personal access to the life and grace of the All-holy Trinity. (True Worship)

4. That the Orthodox Church has produced untold numbers of Saints throughout the centuries—persons who bear within themselves in *true sanctity* the uncreated grace of God. (True Sanctity)

All four of these factors—history, doctrine, worship, and spirituality—are all different aspects of the fullness of the true faith. None is sufficient without the others.

It is the bold claim of Orthodox Christians that only within Orthodoxy Christianity are all four of these factors fully and correctly present.



# ON THE CHURCH AS A SPIRITUAL HOSPITAL

If a person does not follow the "right way" he can-not ever reach his destination. If he does not take the proper "remedies," he cannot ever acquire health; in other words, he will experience no therapeutic benefits. If we compare Orthodox spirituality with other Christian traditions, the difference in approach and method of therapy is evident.

A fundamental teaching of the Holy Fathers is that the Church is a "Hospital" which cures the wounds of man. In many passages of Holy Scripture such language is used. One such passage is that of the parable of the Good Samaritan: "But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was. And when he saw him, he had com-passion. So he went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; and he set him on his own animal, and brought him to an inn, and took care of him. On the next day, when he departed, he took out two denarii, and gave them to the innkeeper, and said to him, 'Take care of him; and whatever

more you spend, when I come again, I will repay you" (Luke 10:33-35).

In this parable, the Samaritan represents Christ who cured the wounded man and led him to the Inn, that is to the "Hospital" which is the Church. It is evident here that Christ is presented as the Healer, the physician who cures man's maladies; and the Church as the true Hospital. It is very characteristic that Saint John Chrysostom, analyzing this parable, presents these truths emphasized above.

Man's life "in Paradise" was reduced to a life governed by the devil and his wiles. "And fell among thieves," that is in the hands of the devil and of all the hostile powers. The wounds man suffered are the various sins, as the prophet David says: "my wounds grow foul and fester because of my foolishness" (Psalm 37). For "every sin causes a bruise and a wound." The Samaritan is Christ Himself who descended to earth from Heaven in order to cure the wounded man. He used oil and wine to "treat" the wounds; in other words, by "mingling His blood with the Holy Spirit, he brought man to life." According to another interpretation, oil corresponds to the comforting word and wine to the harsh word. Mingled together they have the power to unify the scattered mind. "He set him on His own beast," that is He assumed human flesh on "the shoulders" of His divinity and ascended incarnate to His Father in Heaven

Then the Good Samaritan, i.e. Christ, took man to the grand, wondrous and spacious inn - to the Church. And He handed man over to the inn keeper, who is the Apostle Paul, and through the Apostle Paul to all bishops and priests, saying: "Take care of the Gentile people, whom I have handed over to you in the Church. They suffer illness wounded by sin, so cure them, using as remedies the words of the Prophets and the teaching of the Gospel; make them healthy through the admonitions and comforting word of the Old and New Testaments." Thus, according to Saint Chrysostom, Paul is he who maintains the Churches of God, "curing all people by his spiritual admonitions and offering to each one of them what they really need."

In the interpretation of this parable by Saint John Chrysostom, it is clearly shown that the Church is a Hospital which cures people wounded by sin; and the bishops and priests are the therapists of the people of God.



# Prayer in Time of Trouble

O God, our help and assistance Who is just and merciful, and Who hears the supplications of Your people, look down upon me a miserable sinner. Have mercy upon me and deliver me from the trouble that besets me, for which I know I am deservedly suffering. I acknowledge and believe, O Lord, that all trials of this life are given by You for our chastisement when we drift away from You and disobey Your commandments. Deal not with me after my sins, but according to Your bountiful mercies, for I am the work of Your hands and You know my weakness.

Grant me, I beseech You, Your divine helping grace, and endow me with patience and strength to endure my tribulations with complete submission to Your Will. You know my misery and suffering and to You, my only hope and refuge, I flee for relief and comfort. Trusting in Your infinite love and compassion, I know that in due time, when You know best, You will deliver me from this trouble and turn my distress into comfort. I shall rejoice in Your mercy and exalt and praise Your Holy Name, of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, forever. Amen.
